The local organization is in the process of constructing the 14 th house in the Curry/Roosevelt County region, with the current project underway for a single mother with three children helping with "sweat equity" to build her house.

For about 30 years, the Lighthouse Mission has sponsored a Children's Christmas Party Event, where kids enjoy free breakfast and lunch and a free fun event with games and activities and receive an age-appropriate gift, with help from generous volunteers.

- 10/01/18 A distraught mother reports her 3 year old son missing, probably kidnapped by his father. The child has epilepsy and could die without medication. The FBI tracks the father for months and doesn't intervene until long after the child has died from a seizure for which his medication was withheld. John Miller of the Taos News will tell us the story in depth on **HERE & THERE**.

- 10/8/18 Many Native Americans in the Southwest live in what are effectively food deserts, places where fresh fruits and vegetables and non-processed foods are simply not available. But in Arizona, Native American farmers are trying to change that. Tayler Brown of Cronkite news of AZ PBS with a story of corn in many colors and beans full of nutritional magic.

- 10/15/18 Has President Donald Trump turned American politics into a Battle of the Sexes? Aimee Allison created the activist group "She the People" to fight for the female perspective on how our country should be governed. She knew her campaign would draw opposition, but after the Brett Kavanaugh hearings, gender politics has hit new lows for civility and new highs for conflict and abuse.

- 10/22/18 It's one of the biggest crimes against human rights in the world today – the government of China's crackdown on the Uighur minority, and other Muslim groups in Western China. Scholar Rian Thum has visited Xinjiang, but said, he couldn't be seen talking with anyone lest he put them in danger of detention.

- 10/29/18 It was more than 4 years ago that I conversed with Medical visionary Dr. Sanjeev Arora of the UNM Health Sciences Center. His Project ECHO has only continued to revolutionize the delivery of world class medical care to rural areas of NM and the world, and restoring the old personal relationship between doctors and their patients.

- 11/5/18 Rain, rain, beautiful rain. We had some this week, but not enough in itself to match the deficit a terrible drought year has inflicted on New Mexico. Laura Paskus, head of the Environmental Project at the NM Political Report, on the barely flowing Rio Grande and the reservoirs it's supposed to draw from and fill, and the prospects for 2019 and beyond.
- 11/12/18 The Israeli makers of the Pegasus spyware suite say they monitor their government customers, for abusive use of its comprehensive snooping capabilities. But, researcher Bill Marczak of The Citizen Lab of the University of Toronto says in many of the 45 countries in which he found evidence of Pegasus in use, the targets were frequently journalists and advocates for human rights.
- 11/19/18 Here in NM, and many other places in America, the recent midterm elections burned through more money than ever before. This is a record with the endurance of a sandcastle. So where and who is the money coming from and is it paying off in votes? Dave Levinthal led a team of reporters from the Center for Public Integrity to answer these questions.
- 11/26/18 It's getting crowded at the border. The Trump Administration's anxiety about caravans of migrants has added hundreds of officers to the Border Patrol and now backed them up with 2100 National Guard forces and between 6 and 7000 regular army troops. And now there are armed volunteer so-called militiamen. The Albuquerque Journal's Angela Kocherga has the story in depth on [HERE & THERE](#).
- 12/3/18 Today's America has come to this: teaching in the public schools, like harvesting green chiles, is a job most Americans don't want to do. So, there are established pipelines for foreign teachers, but what should be a win-win for everybody has been corrupted. - 12/10/18 People worry that children with disabilities may have a hard time keeping up with the rest of the kids in a mainstream public education classroom. But documentarian Dan Habib says that's not true at all. - 12/17/18 It was called America's Main Street, the Mother Road and the Will Rogers Highway, US Route 66, the highway that ran from Chicago to Santa Monica, from NM's eastern border with TX to its western edge at AZ. Photographer Terrence Moore traversed Route 66 many times, took his pics, got his kicks and shares the pleasures with us.
- 12/24/18 Here's to crossroads cities; places where lots of people are always passing through and lots of different kinds of people choose to stick around. Like New Orleans, whose 300 years attracted a historian's delight of characters and complications. Jason Berry takes full advantage in his delightful new book *The City of a Million Dreams*.
- 12/31/18 Remember the song, "Do You Believe in Miracles?" Whatever your personal answer, it's a question of much more importance to Pope Francis, who emphatically does believe in them. But veteran reporter John Thavis, the author of *The Vatican Diaries* and *The Vatican Prophecies* says belief is only the beginning for setting a policy for dealing with miraculous claims.
