<u>We ran the following program to address it</u> (Title): KENW Regional Newscast (w/ KENW News Director Janet Lyn)		
Date: 04/01/2019	Time of Day: AM/PM 5x	Duration: 5:00
TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with the new State Auditor in New Mexico, Brian Colon, about his values and vision to improve accountability, transparency and excellence with the handling of public state taxpayer funds. Brian Colon had only been in office 90 days at the time of his in-studio interview with KENW-FM, and he was in Portales, NM, with his staff from Santa Fe to conduct free training for about 130 people in eastern New Mexico who deal with public taxpayer funds. The free annual statewide training aims to help anyone working with public taxpayer funds understand their responsibilities and to hold them accountable to reduce the amount of waste, fraud and abuse of public taxpayer funds in the state of New Mexico. The NM Office of the State Auditor conducts about 1,000 audits annually of publicly-funded organizations and government entities.		

ISSUE: HELPING RURAL SURVIVORS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AND THEIR CHILDREN

TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with Lorna Fike, executive director of Hope Harbor, a regional non-profit organization in southeastern New Mexico that provides a range of assistance and support for women and children who are survivors of domestic violence. Hope Harbor, based in the Ruidoso/Cloudcroft area of New Mexico, was founded to provide full help and support for domestic violence survivors through a 2-year, long-term transitional living home. Hope Harbor works in partnership with the local emergency Domestic Violence Shelter, which offers maximum stays of 3 months for survivors, as well as with Eastern New Mexico University-Ruidoso and the New Mexico Workforce Connection to help rural survivors of domestic violence pursue higher education, improve job skills to get better jobs, and in general, build their support system and confidence. Hope Harbor's goal is to help domestic violence survivors "renew a hope for the future."		

ISSUE: LOCAL ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT ACT ELECTION IN PORTALES, NM

TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with Portales City Clerk Joan Martinez-Terry about the April 4, 2019 Local Economic Development Act (LEDA) mail-ballot election asking Portales voters whether to approve expanded uses of public taxpayer funds earmarked for local economic development projects. This special local election in Portales was required to be by mail ballot because of new state LEDA rules. The measure passed, but voter turnout was low. Of 5,989 eligible voters in Portales who received the special mail ballots, only 802 ballots were returned for about a 13 percent voter turnout for the LEDA election. Portales city officials said they expected voter turnout to be much higher since all registered voters received a special mail ballot.		

ISSUE: PREPARING FOR AND RESPONDING TO REGIONAL STORM-RELATED POWER OUTAGES

TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with Xcel Energy spokesman Wes Reeves about recent and impending severe thunderstorms with extremely high, damaging winds that have the capacity to down power lines and cause widespread power outages across eastern New Mexico and West Texas. After lengthy power outages that affected multiple parts of the region during the most recent severe storm, Xcel Energy is working to provide consumers with more information and resources, as well as ways to prepare for and respond to power outages. Xcel Energy offers consumers a mobile app, an interactive website and a 24/7 toll-free phone number to report power outages, downed power lines, receive the latest power-related updates and get more information quickly.		

ISSUE: COMMUNITY SAFETY AND REGIONAL EMERGENCY RESPONSE TO MASSIVE LOCAL WILDFIRE		
<u>We ran the following program to address it</u> (Title): KENW Regional News (with KENW News Director Janet Lyn)

TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with Portales Fire Chief Gary Nuckols about a massive, fast-moving wildfire that began 4/10/19 near Portales, NM, and what is being done to battle the blaze and protect lives and property as much as possible. The wildfire initially caused the complete loss of 4 occupied homes in the fire's path before firefighters could contain the wildfire. All occupants of those homes and others in the area were safely evacuated, but one homeowner suffered extensive smoke inhalation and had to be hospitalized, along with one rural firefighter who suffered minor burn injuries. All livestock in the rural wildfire area also were evacuated with no injuries or losses. Some rural road closures were enforced to protect community safety.		

ISSUE: HELPING RURAL SURVIVORS OF SEXUAL ABUSE AND SEXUAL VIOLENCE IN EASTERN NM

TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with the director of ARISE New Mexico, a regional non-profit organization that serves 7 counties in rural eastern New Mexico: Curry, Lea, Quay, Union, DeBaca, Roosevelt and Harding counties, providing survivors of sexual abuse and/or sexual violence with support and resources. ARISE NM has a main office in Portales, NM, and a second office in Clovis, NM, as well as a 24/7 free crisis hotline where advocates are always available to talk with survivors and/or provide information and resources for survivors and their families, as well as information for anyone in the local communities. Currently, more than 50 percent of the caseload for ARISE NM in the 7 eastern New Mexico counties involves children who are victims/survivors of sexual abuse and sexual violence. ARISE NM always offers free, confidential services, assistance and support and also aims to teach community members how to prevent sexual abuse and sexual violence and how to respond when there are situations involving sexual abuse and sexual violence.

TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with Greg Waggoner, the Eastern New Mexico University Athletics Director, about ENMU's first time ever hosting the regional Lone Star Conference Outdoor Track & Field College Championships in Portales, with competing universities from across New Mexico and Texas. Eastern New Mexico University's new, regulation, outdoor track and field facilities in Portales also have made a tremendous improvement in recruiting track and field college student/athletes, increasing opportunities for students and coaches and providing more potential for community and regional events in a predominantly rural part of New Mexico.		

ISSUE: AWARENESS ABOUT THE EPIDEMIC OF VIOLENCE AGAINST NATIVE AMERICAN WOMEN

TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with New Mexico's senior U.S. Senator Tom Udall, D-N.M., about the growing number of missing and murdered Native American women in New Mexico and across the country. Across the United States, about 84 percent of Native American and indigenous women --- or about 4 in 5 Native women --- experience violence at some point in their lives; 1 out of 3 Native women are raped; and in some tribal communities, the murder rate for Native women is more than 10 times the national average, according to Senator Udall. The senator talked about the need to implement stronger protections for Native American and indigenous women and to reauthorize the federal Violence Against Women Act.		

ISSUE: SEASONAL IMPROVEMENTS IN NEW MEXICO'S WATER RESOURCES FROM SNOWFALL

TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with 9 th Judicial District Court Judge Donna Mowrer, who serves the rural eastern New Mexico residents in the Curry County and Roosevelt County areas around Clovis/Portales, about a new Online Dispute Resolution pilot program being launched by the New Mexico court system to offer rural New Mexico consumers a free, voluntary program to try to resolve civil cases involving debt and money due issues without having to go to court. The new pilot program provides the option of resolving those debt/money due civil cases through e-mail communication and even free online mediation services via e-mail, thus enabling consumers to avoid having to appear in court, or hire an attorney, or pay court costs. Judge Mowrer helped inspire and initiate the Online Dispute Resolution pilot program for New Mexico, which is why the 9 th Judicial District in eastern New Mexico was selected to launch the new service for rural residents.		

ISSUE: SUPPORTING COLLEGE CYCLISTS WORKING TO FIGHT CANCER

The cyclists are riding 4,000 miles from Texas to Alaska through New Mexico to engage local communities in the fight against cancer and to share their own families' experiences with fighting cancer.		

ISSUE: RECRUITING AND RETAINING TEACHERS IN NEW MEXICO & SUPPORTING STUDENT SUCCESS

TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with Karen Trujillo, the governor's new appointee serving as New Mexico Public Education Department Cabinet Secretary, who has been working in that role since January 2019. Trujillo discussed her vision and goals for public education in New Mexico, especially ways to recruit and retain more teachers in New Mexico and ways to help improve student success through early childhood education opportunities. One long-term recruitment opportunity being used is a program called "Educators Rising," which works with students in middle school/junior high and high school who are interested in being teachers. There are now 42 chapters of Educators Rising across New Mexico involving more than 600 students being encouraged to become future educators. Efforts are being made to increase support and resources for existing New Mexico teachers, including more mentoring for early-career teachers because about 50 percent of new teachers leave the teaching field in the first 5 years in education, according to the latest figures. Trujillo is actively recruiting people back to the teaching field in New Mexico by highlighting opportunities such as new scholarships and a new alternative licensure program. Trujillo also discussed the need in New Mexico to increase and improve universal student access to early childhood education.		

ISSUE: EDUCATING NEW MEXICO VOTERS ABOUT LOCAL ELECTION CODE CHANGES

Date: 6/26/19 & 6/27/19	Time of Day: AM/PM 5x	Duration: 5:00
TYPE A BRIEF DESCRIPTION OF PROGRAM (Format, participants, content, etc.): In-depth interview with the Curry County, NM, Clerk about recent changes to the state's Local Election Code, which will require local elections in November of odd-numbered years, starting this year in November 2019, for elections involving local school boards/school bond issues, community college issues, and any municipalities that opt in. The November 2019 local election in Roosevelt County and Curry County --- currently the only 2 "dry" counties in New Mexico --- likely will include ballot questions asking registered voters in each county whether to approve the sale of alcohol in the unincorporated areas of the county outside the city limits of Clovis and Portales. Approval of the issue would pave the way for liquor sales at rural county fairgrounds.

But Canada doesn't just welcome the foreigners, it helps them succeed in their new homeland. One key element: public education. How does Canada make that work? Kavitha Cardoza of Education Week and the PBS NewsHour explains.

4/08/19 Just about every device in your car which makes driving safer got there faster because of the work of Joan Claybrook, the original head of the National Transportation Safety Board and former President of Public Citizen.
